

## New Records

All the collections below have been contributed over the past few months. Like all Scran records, they're rights-cleared, meaning you can reuse and copy them for educational and personal use.



## National Library of Scotland Records from the Medical History of India Online

These rare documents form part of the India Papers collection, an extensive collection of official publications from British India, held by the National Library of Scotland.

The digitisation of the medical history volumes was funded by awards from the Wellcome Trust and records the demands placed by both epidemic and endemic diseases on the colonial Indian state and its development of public health in the period from c.1850 to 1920.

The reports in this collection reflect the state's efforts to study, understand and control diseases like cholera, plague, malaria and leprosy. Fascinating documents for historians, medical students and geographers, the full set of documents can be viewed at www.scran.ac.uk/s/health+army+india.

## **Royal College of Surgeons**

## **Danish Design from 1900 onwards**

Thanks to a recent Danish trip undertaken by one of our staff, Scran has recently acquired some new images of 20th and 21st century Danish design. Perfect for any product design, art & design or technologies courses, the photos provide an overview of Danish design from the early 20th century to the present day, taking in jewellery, glassware and especially furniture and housewares, focusing on designers including Arne Jacobsen, Verner Panton and Hans Wegner. ## Podsafe music- copyright-cleared audio loops

More and more students and staff are going beyond simply copying and pasting images from Scran into worksheets or classwork. Increasingly, we are seeing Scran resources (pictures, audio clips and video clips) being used in multimedia work, including short films and instructional videos for classes. If you're doing any multimedia work, check out our podsafe audio clips, which are essentially short pieces of instrumental "library" music, ranging in length from 30 seconds to a few minutes, and covering

## The Gude Cause- Suffrage March records



One of the more unusual projects to appear on the Scran site in recent months is the huge cache of photos taken by many of the participants in 2009's Gude Cause march. The march, in Edinburgh, commemorated 100 years of women's suffrage, and looked back to historic struggles as well as celebrating democracy. Many participants dressed in historic costume or marched with historic banners, and the crowd was addressed by many speakers from the Scottish Parliament.

Some of the organisers of the march approached Scran to ask if we could host some images and other documents from the event.

We've said yes, and now there are over 2,000 images (and quite a few audio records from the event) on our site, with more being added as we go to press. Unusually, these images were "crowdsourced" after the event, when dozens of individual photographers were approached through social networking sites about contributing their photos. More information is slowly being added to these photos about who is in them, what is being depicted and so forth, and the Gude Cause are hoping that others who participated in the march will assist in annotating the images over the coming months and years. #### **Bernat Klein**

Bernat Klein was a textile designer whose designs were used by many haute couturiers, including Dior, Yves St. Laurent and Balenciaga, in the 1950s and 60s. Later, he launched his own clothing collections from a studio designed by the architect Peter Wormersley. ## **Napier University projects**

Scran has recently been working extensively with Napier University, providing content and guidance on a couple of projects. Working with tutors from the Digital Media BSc (Hons) course and members of the Scran staff, Napier students created a number of short films that showcased the students editing and narrative skills, as well as introducing them to the world of licensed media. The resulting films formed part of their coursework. In addition, some Napier students have been working with the Edinburgh College of Art to participate in an innovative project entitled TOTeM (Tales of Things and Electronic

Memory). TOTeM is an initiative funded by the Digital Economy Research Councils. It uses QR codes (which look and act a bit like barcodes- you can see one above) to link physical objects to electronically-stored stories and memories.

One example of their work is at a London Oxfam shop, where donated items are linked to videos and stories made by the items' former owners. The buyers of the donated items can discover the stories by using a QR code scanner in the shop, or by scanning the QR code with a suitably-enabled mobile phone.

For the Napier/ECA TOTeM project, students were asked to compile short movies that relate to objects

in an exhibition at the National Museum of Scotland. They used Scran materials as part of these mini-movies. Visitors to the museum can view the objects, point their phones at the accompanying QR code, and then see the supplementary information created by the students.

## Easy access from schools

95% of schools now have IP authenticated access. This means that when you or your pupils visit Scran from school premises, our site should detect where you're logging in from and grant you automatic access with no need to remember a user name or password. If, when you log on to Scran from your school, you don't see a drop-down menu of schools in your local authority, PLEASE LET US KNOW by either phoning (0131 662 1456) or emailing (andrew.james@rcahms.gov.uk). You can help us even more by sending us your school's IP address when you email. To find this out, simply go to www.scran.ac.uk/ipcheck.php where you'll see a phrase of letters and numbers. Copy and paste this in an email to us and we should be able to sort out your automatic access quickly and easily.

## Scran Glow group



Scran is a big part of Glow, the Scottish schools intranet. For instance, you can log-in to Scran with a Glow user name and password, and materials can be shared easily and legally through Glow.

We now have a Scran Glow group, where we'll be highlighting resources, offering hints and tips and pointing up our training

### **Copyright podcasts**





High-profile cases where internet users have been fined for using and distributing copyrighted pictures, video and audio have highlighted the problem of using illegal digital materials in the classroom. Of course, all Scran materials are copyright-cleared for use by subscribers in noncommercial educational or personal projects, so you can use them without worry.

But to dispel some of the myths and misconceptions around copyright, and to highlight some resources (including Scran) that offer licensed content for classrooms, Scran has created a series of short, linked video podcasts.
